BEST PRACTICE NO. 1:2015-16

TITLE OF THE PRACTICE:

STUDENT WELFARE SCHEME UNDER SHRI RAJPAL KAPOOR FOUNDATION

GOAL:

The college has launched a student welfare scheme under Shri Rajpal Kapoor Foundation with an objective of community outreach and extension. Under this scheme, the college aims at generating funds which in turn, could be utilized for awarding scholarships / educational help - both in cash and kind to the the economically disadvantaged, deserving and needy students.

THE CONTEXT:

Some of the around 4000 students of the college come from the economically underprivileged section of the society for whom financial support is a necessity for pursuing university education. In order to support such students in the pursuit of higher education, the college has created a corpus fund with the active support of the family of late Shri Rajpal Kapoor who was an active member of the managing body of the college, the Uttari Bharat Sabha. The college also managed to generate funds through voluntary contributions from employees, students and some philanthropists from outside the college.

THE PRACTICE:

As an initiating step for providing the monetary assistance, a committee comprising of Principal Dr. Ajay M. Bhamare (Chairperson), Vice Principals Prof. Padmakar Mane, Prof. Probal Gupta and Prof. Daniel Shankori, faculty members Prof. Shailesh Nagda, Prof. Ms. Sunita Bhamare, Prof. Ms. C. Srivastava, Prof. Satish Narayanan, Prof. Uday Shetty and Prof. Tirupati Basutkar, was formed to decide on the modalities of the scheme. The committee invited applications, scrutinized them and shortlisted students for the award of scholarships.

The committee succeeded in generating an initial corpus fund of Rs. 2,89,700. The committee with the help of faculty members received 105 applications from deserving students. The committee deliberated for a week on the merits of the

applications through a democratic process of scrutiny and interview. It selected 42 students, (30 from the degree college and 12 from the junior college), who fulfilled all the eligibility criteria decided by the committee for the award of scholarships.

All the 42 students were given Rs. 1000 per month, starting from September 2015, till May 2016 towards financial aid. To facilitate online transfer of funds, the students were told to open a Zero Balance Account with Punjab National Bank at its Bhandup (East) branch. In addition to this monetary aid, they were also given a set of all text books on returnable basis and a set of six notebooks each.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS:

The 42 students with insufficient family income who were finding it difficult to pursue higher education, were benefited from this initiative of the college. The feedback received from the students and their parents about this initiative was also quite encouraging.

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED:

Identifying the really needy students had to be done very carefully in the absence of adequate documentary information about the financial status of the applicants.

RESOURCES REQUIRED:

More funds will enable the college to provide funds to more number of deserving students and thereby mitigate their hardships.

BEST PRACTICE NO. 2:2015-16

TITLE OF THE PRACTICE:

BRINGING JOY INTO THE LIVES OF ORPHANED AND DESTITUTE CHILDREN

GOAL:

To fulfill the objective of Institutional Social Responsibility to the best possible extent, the college has voluntarily initiated an yearly activity to provide a few moments of joy and happiness to the orphaned and destitute children in Mumbai city and suburbs.

THE CONTEXT:

In the vast expanse of Mumbai Metropolitan Region, a significant number of young children who are orphaned and destitute, without any blood relative to care for them, exist side by side, with many people who have the means of enjoying the good things of life. While orphanages and homes for destitute children are operated by government and non-government organizations, there is still a lot of scope for the affluent sections of the society and educational institutions to take some small initiatives to bring a bit of happiness and thrill among these children.

THE PRACTICE:

This initiative involves organizing some special activities which will provide them with an experience that will be a combination of care and affection coupled with some games and entertainment so that at least during that day they get an opportunity to have an experience that is different from their daily routine. This will also provide the students and staff of the college an occasion when they can fulfill their moral responsibility of doing something creative and constructive for the benefit of such children.

As a part of this initiative, the college organized a one-day event for the benefit of such orphaned and destitute children on the 9th of January, 2016. In the morning they were picked up from their institutions and taken to the popular picnic spot 'Tikujiniwadi' at Thane. There they spent around four hours enjoying the various rides in the water park and were provided with a good lunch, which was something different from their normal daily food. From

they were escorted to the college campus where an entertainment programme had been planned for them.

They enjoyed and also participated in a series of activities such as games, dance, music, contests, etc. A magician was also present on the occasion to entertain the children with his tricks of magic. At the end of the programme, each child was given a gift hamper consisting of items of utility such as tooth paste, tooth brush, nail cutter, talcum powder, disinfectant, hair oil and towel. The Rotary Clubs of Mumbai Aces and Mulund Hills also contributed significantly to the success of this activity.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS:

A group of 138 orphaned and destitute children, the total strength of Chembur Children's Home, Mumbai accompanied by their 20 teachers and 11 children who were spastics, from Mulund, Mumbai enjoyed the day-long activities. A feedback was received from the management of the Children's Home about the success of the programme and its impact on the children.

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED:

Time was a major constraint in organizing a large number of events for the children. The endurance capacity of the young children in the age group of 8 to 15 to participate in many events in a single day had also to be taken into account. Planning activities which would match the expectations of the children was also a major challenge.

RESOURCES REQUIRED:

More finance, creative planning and ability to understand the needs of children of a lower age are some of the factors that need to be looked into, for improvising this activity.

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
