STUDENT WELFARE SCHEME: 2016 – 17

REPORT

The Goal:

The college has been providing a student welfare scheme under Shree Rajpal Kapoor Foundation with an objective of community outreach and extension. For the second consecutive year, Foundations' call for donation as a means to finance the student welfare scheme received an overwhelming response, from college staff and external philanthropists alike. A good amount of money was also added to it from the collection received from 'Rupee Revolution- Share and Care scheme' practiced by Department of Self financing courses. In all an amount of Rs. 2, 80,980/- (Rupees Two Lakh Eighty thousand Nine Hundred and Eighty) was collected through these means.

The meeting of the committee chaired by Principal Sir, Dr. Ajay Bhamare on 01st September, 2016 unanimously decided to give away the entire collected funds as Student Scholarship Award to the needy and deserving students. A week long process of calling for applications, scrutiny and selection was initiated. From among the 149 applications received, scrutinized and interviewed by the committee, 33 students; 15 from degree and 18 from Junior college, were shortlisted and declared eligible for the scholarship. The committee also decided to give away a scholarship award of Rs. 8,000/- starting from September, 2016 to April, 2017, to each of the 33 duly selected and deserving students. To facilitate online transfer of funds, students were asked to open a zero balance student account at Punjab National Bank, Bhandup (East) branch.

Apart from the scholarship awarded, a total of 22 students (19 from degree and 03 from junior college) were given the entire set of semester textbooks.

The Context:

The students are informed about the scheme through the college prospectus which contains an application form for the scholarship, through general circular intimating students about the scheme and procedure of application and through a notice displayed at all the prominent places in the college premises.

Students for the scholarship are selected by adopting a merit-cum-need based approach. The intention is to help genuinely needy students in whatever best way possible.

The Practice:

After applications for this scholarship are received, they are scrutinized and students are called for personal face to face interviews with the selection committee. The biggest difficulty is the outreach.

Even after due publicity and information provided to students, the committee feels that deserving and needy students are hesitant to approach the committee for various reasons, the main reason being peer fear. Getting a regular stream of philanthropists and fund contributors is another area of difficulty faced by the committee.

It is observed that the beneficiaries of the scheme tend to be more regular and punctual not only in studies but also in co-curricular activities. It is also noticed that a positive and encouraging behavioural change takes place amongst student and they become more responsible citizens.

The committee wishes to increase the number of beneficiaries in the future.

VISIT TO ORPHANAGE 2016-17

REPORT

The Goal:

It has been a healthy practice adopted by various business houses, philanthropists, film stars and sport persons and even common people to give monetary help to orphaned and destitute children on occasions such as birthdays. In the same line we also decided to give some of our precious time and thereby bring joy into their lives by spending one full day in their company as our social responsibility. We thought giving time is better than giving money; for joy is priceless.

For this purpose, students of the college have come together under the banner of Ract Club with an intention to help the institution fulfil its social commitment. It is a student initiative undertaken and carried out with utmost sincerity and responsibility by students under the guidance of faculty members. The objective is to bring joy and happiness into the lives of orphaned and destitute children.

The Context:

In addition to our academic endeavours, we have also been practicing activities for social upliftment and benefit such as free medical check up, free medicine distribution, blood donation, yoga camps, free eye check up and distribution of spectacles, cleanliness drives, fun fairs and entertainment activities for underprivileged and orphaned children. However, our best practice remains Fun and Fair activity that we organize for orphaned and destitute children. We feel extremely happy and proud to spend time and share our resources with these underprivileged children. The joy and happiness that we see on the faces of these children motivates and inspires us to continue our efforts.

The Practice:

On 9th Jan 2016, 138 orphans / destitute children from the children's Aid Society Chembur Children's Home, Mankhurd and 11 spastics from Mulund were taken to Tikuji Ni Wadi (Amusement Park) for a fun-day. They were accompanied by 28 teachers from Chembur Children Home and two teachers from Mulund and 7 teachers from our college. The children reached Tikuji Ni Wadi at 9.30 am and played in the water park and enjoyed various rides till 3.30 pm. This was followed by a magnificent magic show to entertain them. Next all the children played one minute variety games outside the auditorium. The children were split into six groups and each group had to complete the games given to them and move on to the next level. In this way all the groups played all the games in an hour's time.
